LESSON BEGINS:

WEEK 6 BEATITUDE MEDITATION:

Read Matthew 5:3-11 Have one read the verses, but have the group join in on the bold section.

Blessed are the **poor in spirit**, for the kingdom of heaven is theirs.

Blessed are **those who mourn**, for they will be comforted.

Blessed are **the humble**, for they will inherit the earth.

Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they will be filled.

Blessed are the merciful, for they will be shown mercy.

Blessed are the **pure in heart**, for they will see God.

Blessed are the **peacemakers**, for they will be called sons of God.

Blessed are those who are **persecuted because of righteousness**, for the kingdom of heaven is theirs.

MERCY: Blessed are the merciful, for they will be shown mercy. (Matthew 5:7)

WEEK 6 SERMON DISCUSSION:

Week 6 Sermon Discussion Questions:

This week the pastor discussed Matthew 5:8, "Blessed are the merciful, for they will be shown mercy."

- What did the pastor say it meant to be merciful?
- What did the pastor say it meant that they will be shown mercy?
- How did the message change or enhance your understanding of this beatitude?
- Did the pastor say anything that was particularly meaningful or encouraging?
- How were you encouraged to apply this beatitude in your daily life or spiritual journey?
- Were there any questions or concerns that you had from the message?

THE GOOD SAMARITAN:

One of the greatest examples of Mercy is found in Jesus' well known story Parable of the Good Samaritan. Read Luke 16:30-35 to familiarize (or refamiliarize) yourself with this story.

"A man was going down from Jerusalem to Jericho and fell into the hands of robbers. They stripped him, beat him up, and fled, leaving him half dead. A priest happened to be going down that road. When he saw him, he passed by on the other side. In the same way, a Levite, when he arrived at the place and saw him, passed by on the other side. But a Samaritan on his journey came up to him, and when he saw the man, he had compassion. He went over to him and bandaged his wounds, pouring on olive oil and wine. Then he put him on his own animal, brought him to an inn, and took care of him. The next day he took out two denarii, gave them to the innkeeper, and said, 'Take care of him. When I come back I'll reimburse you for whatever extra you spend.'

- Was there anything new or special about this story that stood out to you during this reading?
- How was the Good Samaritan merciful?
- Why was his mercy unexpected?

As you watch the video, ask yourself, "How has this week's teaching changed your understanding on what it means to show and be shown mercy?"

- Derwin Gray suggests that, "Mercy isn't afraid to touch human suffering." How did the Good Samaritan touch suffering?
- What can we learn from the example of the Merciful Samaritan on what it means to touch suffering?
- Derwin Gray says, "Mercy is not afraid to cross ethnic, cultural, and religious barriers." How does the Good Samaritan show us how this?

- Derwin talks about mercy is caring for 'the other." What does he mean by 'the other'?
- Who was 'the other' in the Merciful Samaritan' story?
- Who are some of the people we might see as 'other'?
- What is keeping you from showing them mercy?

Derwin explains that the Samaritan was an outcast because he was a Jew and a gentile in one body and that the church is called to embody that same description.

- How does the Samaritan embody the church?
- How should that picture inspire and empower us to show mercy to others.

WEEK 6 WRAP-UP

CONSIDER THIS: Mercy costs something. Extending mercy to others is not free. It cost the Samaritan 2 weeks wages and it cost Jesus his life. What are you willing to spend to show mercy to others?

Read Matthew 5:3-11 Out loud together as a group.

Closing Prayer:

- How can the group pray for you and others to have a "blessed" (makarios) week?
- **Derwin says that prayer leads us to action.** What merciful action is God calling you to take as you wrap up in prayer this week?

Have a group member close in prayer or provide an opportunity for all members to pray for each other.
