Scripture Passage: Titus 3:1-2, 2-10 Sermon Discussion from Sunday, May 21

3:1 Remind them to submit to rulers and authorities, to obey, to be ready for every good work, 2 to slander no one, to avoid fighting, and to be kind, always showing gentleness to all people.

2:2 Older men are to be self-controlled, worthy of respect, sensible, and sound in faith, love, and endurance. 3 In the same way, older women are to be reverent in behavior, not slanderers, not slaves to excessive drinking. They are to teach what is good, 4 so that they may encourage the young women to love their husbands and to love their children, 5 to be self-controlled, pure, workers at home, kind, and in submission to their husbands, so that God's word will not be slandered.

6 In the same way, encourage the young men to be self-controlled 7 in everything. Make yourself an example of good works with integrity and dignity in your teaching. 8 Your message is to be sound beyond reproach, so that any opponent will be ashamed, because he doesn't have anything bad to say about us.

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Paul is giving Titus instructions for how we, young & old, male & female, slave & free, are to be so that we can be effective witnesses for Jesus.

- As followers of Jesus, what should our lives look like?
- Does this mean that we are to blindly follow leaders? If not, then what might Paul be getting at when he says to submit and obey?
- How does being disobedient, slanderous, and argumentative negatively shape our witness?
- How can offering goodness, kindness, and gentleness draw people to Christ?
- How have you seen Titus 3:1-2 lived out positively and negatively in our culture.

SUBMIT: To submit or be submissive has a negative connotation in our culture. We tend to view it as a loss of our individuality and giving into the impulses and demands of another. The Greek word that is often translated as submit can literally be translated "stand under." In other words, as followers of Jesus we are willingly standing under others offering our support. We are called to stand under others so that we can understand them in order to best show them the love of Christ.

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Galatians 5: 22-23 The fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and **self-control**.

The fruits of the spirit are attributes cultivated in us when we are living in harmony with God's spirit. As we seek to follow God and live in Christlikeness we are empowered by the Holy Spirit. It is through the work of the holy spirit that we can truly express love, joy, and self-control.

Titus 2:9-10 Slaves are to submit to their masters in everything, and to be well-pleasing, not talking back 10 or stealing, but demonstrating utter faithfulness, so that they may adorn the teaching of God our Savior in everything.

Slaves: Slavery is abhorrent! Some people are upset that Paul does not renounce slavery and call for an end to such treatment of people who are created equal in God's image. This is difficult to understand and hard to justify. Unfortunately, a quick reading of this verse and you can see how people have used it to unjustly treat others and demand their ungodly obedience. For the purpose of this study, we will follow the leading many modern scholars will change the focus from slaves and masters to employees and employers. While it does not address all of the issues, it does help us understand how we can live Christlike in our current cultural contexts. .
